Arrivals from America into Liverpool were 2,063 boxes against 609 in the corresponding week last year. American singed sides are offered at 58s and 64s, according to weights and quality, short rib-in middles at 63s and 64s, Cumberland cut 60s and 62s, and long cut hams in salt at 60s and 64s, with few sales reported.  
 Beef—Demand last week was disappointing, no change in prices, and fine qualities are held firmly.  
 Butter—Imports of Irish 1,266 firkins. Arrived to-day and on the way from Ireland about 2,300 firkins. From the Continent by direct steamers 10,576 casks were reported against 9,568 last year; from France via Southampton and Railway 8,159 packages against 11,218, and from America into Liverpool 1,132 against 468 last year. Supplies of French were short last week and prices advanced considerably creating an improved demand for finest mild Irish—crane brand Corks and genuine Limericks, and sales to a fair extent of each description were made at our quotations. Higher prices are now required by Irish shippers which are not responded to here. To-day fine Friesland sells at 116s to 118s, Zwolle and Kampen 102s to 112s, Danish and Kiel none, Bosch 76s to 84s, Leer 84s to 92s, Jersey 90s 96s to 104s, Normandy 90s, 106s to 120s, and Morlaix 76s to 80s. The weather is everything that can be desired for pastures.  
 Cheese—Imports from America into Liverpool 41,691 boxes against 32,648 in the corresponding week last year. Demand last week was active and prices for all qualities were 2s dearer.  
 Hams—Fine qualities of Irish are in moderate request. Irish dried American are neglected.  
 Lard—For both blandered and keg prices are steady without much demand.  
 Pork—Pickled middles dull. Pime mess of good quality is firmly held and stocks are small.
