All have been remanded on bail to Limerick Liberties District Court.

MUNSTER FAIR

Prices Lower

The Munster Fair in Limerick yesterday morning was one of the largest for many years. As some farmers put it, it was as large as two fairs. Yet trade was not too brisk. Vendors held out for enhanced values, with the result that transactions were slow. Later, however, both buyers and vendors came to terms, and there was a general clearance at prices somewhat less than those obtained at the previous Munster Fair.

There was a rush in the dairy department, and this section was cleared at vendors' own quotations. As high as £32 each was realised for one lot of aged cows in springing down condition. The average price ranged from £25 to £30. Beef was also dear and realised 34s. per cwt. on foot. Fat bulls for export were sought after, and a few lots were disposed of at £21 each. In the store section, as stated, prices dropped.

MAXIMUM FLOUR PRICES.

The Minister for Supplies has made a Order, entitled Emergency Powers (Control of Prices) (No. 25) Order, under which the prices at which wheaten flour may be sold by producers for consumption in Eire must not exceed the following:—

Bakers' Flour (Strong) ..	45/- per sack
Banded Flour	44/- per sack
Shop Flour	41/6 per sack

A sack for the purposes of the Order contains 280lbs., and prices are free on rail.

The prices mark an increase of 1/- on previous figures.
