House of Commons Library, May 16th, 1890.

DEAR SIE—I read on the Limerick papers with satisfaction that the citizens are forming a committee to make a final effort to have the Libraries Act put in force, and as I had the honour of moving its introduction I would wish to state my views clearly, and make some suggestions which I would hope might facilitate the scheme.

The Corporation has been unanimous in its adoption of the Act, and the first annual levy in its aid, amounting to £130, is at its disposal, and the only detail wanting is to procure a local habitation in which to commence operations.
