DEATH OF MR RICHARD WILSON.

We deeply regret to record the sad and unexpected demise of Mr Richard Wilson, principal of the firm of Mullock and Sons, ship brokers, of this city. Mr Wilson had been at business till a late hour on Saturday evening last. On that night he was seized with a stroke of paralysis, and apoplexy, and notwithstanding all that medical skill could do he passed away on Sunday night, to the inexpressible grief of his wife and relatives. The deceased gentleman's name had long been connected with maritime and commercial interests of various kinds. He was a man of great tact and business capacity, while his courteous and retiring disposition won for him the respect and esteem of all classes of the public with which he had so much to do. As a member of the Harbour Board, which position he held since the death of his brother-in-law, the late Mr Luke Mullock, in 1881, Mr Wilson's cool and temperate judgment was highly appreciated, and was also his wise counsel, on all matters affecting the interests of the port. For some twenty-five years Mr Wilson had been a member of the Chamber of Commerce, and was connected with various benevolent societies in the city. His comparatively early demise is deeply regretted by his fellow citizens, and the deepest sympathy is felt with Mrs Wilson and family in their great affliction. The funeral, we believe, will take place to-morrow at nine o'clock for St. Mary's. The flags of the vessels in the port are half mast high as a mark of respect to the memory of the deceased gentleman, and the Harbour Board also adjourned their fortnightly meeting yesterday as a mark of respect.
