DEATH OF A POST OFFICE OFFICIAL.

It is said, we don't know on what foundation, that the development of Mr Fitzgerald's illness was due to the defective sanitary arrangements of the Markets Post Office, of which the deceased young gentleman had been in charge for a considerable time past. If such is the case the Post Office should surely lose no time in having an examination made of the office, and remedying the matter without delay. Mr Fitzgerald was a most courteous and obliging official, and one who possessed a thorough knowledge of his business, as evidenced by the fact that though only 24 years of age he had attained an important position in the service. Last evening the remains were removed from St Michael's R.C Church for interment at Mount St. Laurence Cemetery. There were present, a large number of the em-ployees of the Post Office representing every department, and several merchants and other citizens. Wreaths were sent by the deceased's colleagues and other friends.
