PROPOSED PARNELL DEMONSTRATION AT NEWCASTLE WEST.

Since the followers of Mr McCarthy dissolved,
by a majority of ten, the branch of the National
League here on Sunday last, the Parnellites
have been busy in striving to gain accessions to
their standard, and it cannot be doubted but
the member for Cork has a strong following in
this town. Posters have been issued calling on
the farmers to rally round the "old chief" who
done so much for them. The National League
is to be re-established, and a public meeting in
support of Mr Parnell is to be held here. At a
special meeting of the Parnell Leadership Com-
mittee, Sunday the 5th of April was fixed as the
day for holding the demonstration, and Mr Par-
nell himself will, it is said, be present, unless
prevented by previous engagements. At all
events several of his prominent followers will at-
tend, and contingents are to be invited from all
portions of West Limerick, so that the meeting
promises to be one of much importance. It is
stated that some members of the McCarthy party
will visit the town, and address an indoor meet-
ing very soon, and in the meantime the National
Federation has been established.—Con.

SUDDEN DEATH OF ALDERMAN PETER M'DONALD, M.P.

Alderman Peter M'Donald, M.P. for North
Sligo, died very suddenly on Thursday evening,
shortly after ten o'clock, at his residence,
Clarinda Park, Kingstown. Mr M'Donald was
apparently in the enjoyment of good health, and
his death was quite unexpected. He was taken
ill shortly before the hour stated, when Dr Mac-
Dermott and Dr Newland were summoned, but
their skill was unavailing. Apoplexy was the
immediate cause of death. Mr McDonald had
been for many years engaged in the wholesale
wine and grocery business in the city. He was
first elected as a Commissioner of Kingstown,
and afterwards represented the Mountjoy Ward,
in the Municipal Council, and was elected as
senior Councillor to the position of Alderman,
which position he occupied up to his death. Mr
M'Donald, was about 51 years of age. He was
High Sheriff of Dublin in 1886, and was an anti-
Parnellite. The deceased gentleman was a na-
tive of Kilduffane, Co Limerick.

The Press Association says—Although no de-
finite arrangement will be made for some days
respecting the vacancy in North Sligo, caused by
the death of Mr Peter M'Donald, there is likely
to be a keen contest for the seat between the two
sections of the Irish party.

The *Freeman's* London correspondent says that
when Mr Parnell returns from Galway arrange-
ments will be made with regard to nominating a
candidate for the seat.

ADJOURNED PETTY SESSIONS.

Mr J. B. Irwin, R.M., Dr O'Shaughnessy, and
Mr Z. Myles presided at the adjourned Petty
Sessions to-day, and disposed of over forty cases
of drunkenness. Fines varying from 2s 6d to
10s 6d were imposed. A man named Michael
Flynn was put forward in custody charged by
Sergeant Hanley with the larceny of two bran
bags. The sergeant stated that he was in a
marine store in Cornwallis street, when the
accused came in and offered the bags for sale;
not being able to satisfactorily account as to how
he became possessed of them, the sergeant
arrested him; he always looked upon the accused
as an honest man. Flynn stated that the bags
were his own, and on the application of the
sergeant he was allowed out to be summoned.
Michael Collins, a jarvey, was charged by Head-
Constable Phelan with having been drunk in
charge of a horse and cart. Mr Irwin said the
charge was a serious one, and inquired if these
men were licensed. Head-Constable Phelan said
they had certificates. Mr Irwin said in Dublin
they would be suspended if found guilty of such
offences. The defendant was fined 10s.

prosecution whatever for the assault.

Dr Fitzmaurice gave evidence as to the inju
received by last witness. There was a seve
lacerated wound on the lip and cheek which pe
trated into the mouth.

The jury returned a verdict of guilty, and l
ordship sentenced him to four months' impris
ment with hard labour.

LARCENY.

Jeremiah Brien was indicted for having stol

MANSLAUGHTER.

Michael Kelleher, a carman, was charged wi
the manslaughter of a man named Dennehy,

John Grady, farmer, deposed that Denneh
the deceased man, left Killorglin with him
the night in question; when they were a sho
distance outside the town, Dennehy got out
his (witness's) car and walked on the road;
car then came up and passed him on towar
Dennehy; the car knocked Dennehy on the ro
and passed over his feet; before Dennehy w
knocked witness cried out—"Don't run over t
man"; after the accident the prisoner, who w
driving the car that knocked Dennehy, dro
away; Dennehy was an old man and was deaf.

Cross-examined by Mr Mahony—Prisoner w
not driving very fast; he drove quicker aft
passing Dennehy.

To his Lordship—He (witness) was of opini
that prisoner didn't know that Dennehy w
injured.

Sergeant M'Birney deposed to having arrest
prisoner, who said he was not driving very fast
the time of the accident.

Evidence for the defence having been given,

The jury retired, and returned with a ve
dict of guilty with a strong recommendation t
mercy.

MANSLAUGHTER.

Mary Connell, a midwife, was charged wi
the manslaughter of a woman named Coffey,
