FISHING AT CASTLECONNELL.—The recent rain has caused an increase of water, and sport has consequently improved. The remainder of the month should yield good sport, as the river is full of fish. On the Summerhill and DeBurgho fisheries Mr G W Greenhill got two salmon, 16 and 30 lbs, on the 4th inst. On the Woodlands fishery Captain Bayley got one salmon, 27 lbs, on the 3rd inst, and one salmon, 12 lbs on the 6th. On the Doonas fishery Mr H Hodges got one peal, 6 lbs, on the 6th instant, and the fishermen killed one salmon, 30 lbs, on the same water on the 3rd. Capt Bayley killed one salmon, 13 lbs, on the 3rd, and one salmon, 18 lbs, on the 4th, on the Hermitage water. On the Newgarden fishery the fishermen killed one peal, 5 lbs, on the 4th instant.—Cor.

DROWNING ACCIDENT AT ADARE MANOR.—On Wednesday morning a labourer named John Liston, who was employed by Lord Dunraven in cleaning up the river at Adare manor, noticed the dead body of a man partly floating in the water near the manor. The police were communicated with, and the body was recognised as that of John Glynn, of Castle Roberts, some two miles from Adare. At the inquest held by Mr Coroner Casey, James Connolly, who occupies the gate lodge opposite the hotel in Adare, stated that the deceased, at about 7 o'clock on the previous evening, asked to be admitted through the gate as it was a short way to his house, and he did so. Deceased seemed to have had some drink taken, but was not drunk. The evidence of Dr Clifford was that the deceased died from exposure and not from drowning, and the jury found a verdict accordingly. It is presumed that Glynn, being an old man, walked into the river in the darkness of the night.
