REDEMPTION SUIT.

Quarter Sessions to-day.
 A redemption suit was heard in which Edmund Ballykeefe, sought from the representative of the late Mr. Stephen F. Dowling an order for the monies lent by the latter with interest to the plaintiff.
 Kelly (instructed by Mr. Doyle), appeared for the plaintiff.
 Kelly (instructed by Mr. R. M'Namara), appeared for the defendants.
 Evidence was taken from the plaintiff's evidence that he was evicted by his landlord from the premises at Ballykeefe. A fortnight before the expiration of the period of redemption had expired, and he came in and paid the arrears of rent amounting to £123 13s 4d, and the total sum of £140.
 Mr. Dowling after the eviction was ordered to pay the amount in cash. He claimed an account from the late Mr. Dowling, a clerk in Mr. Dowling's office, and produced a receipt for £100 in order to get his land back.
 On cross-examination he said he did not get more than £60 and £70. Three years after the eviction he got £60 as a compulsory settlement.
 There was no such thing as bringing the matter before the Land League. The late Mr. Dowling proposed to send him to America but he refused to go.
 In the defence, Mr. McCoy, an official in Mr. Dowling's office, produced a book containing the handwriting of the late Mr. Hickey, dated 27th November, 1884, to Edmond Kelly, by cash £60 for goodwill of the farm and a second was dated April 10th, 1886—cash, £60 to E. Mulcahy, £70. Mr. Tom Hogan corroborated the latter payment which he underwrote in order to send Mulcahy and his family to Australia. He knew nothing of the agreement between the parties, but he thought the case was the matter off.
 Mr. Lynch said they gave him all £500.
 Jeremiah Dowling said he would sell the farm for £300, and give Mulcahy the preference.
 Mr. Doyle offered £200, which was declined.
 Mr. Honer said that Mr. Dowling was under a legal obligation to give the further sum of £100 which was given to send the plaintiff abroad.
 Mr. Dowling died a rich man, he would have been a great deal richer but for all the money he had and the enormous employment he had.
 His Honor dismissed the action with costs.

THE LOCAL BANKRUPTCY COURT

In discussing the recent deputation at the Poor Law Board yesterday, general regret was expressed that from the tone of the Press it might be thought that the application for a local bankruptcy court had been refused outright.
 It was stated by Mr. E. J. Long, High Sheriff, that was not so, but that the Lord Chancellor had given as favourable a reply as could be expected. It was pointed out that the only obstacle was the Treasury, and Mr. Long's body said Judge Adams had promised to do the work for nothing.

QUESTION OF DRAINAGE CHARGE

At the Quarter Sessions to-day, The Knight of Glin sued Patrick Leahy to recover six years interest on a loan of £200, being a drainage charge in respect of the lands of Ballinacrow. The loan had been applied for to the Board of Works.
 Mr. Phelps, instructed by Mr. Dodds, for the plaintiff.
 Mr. P. Kelly, instructed by Mr. Kenny, for the defendant.
 The defence was a denial of liability under the terms of the lease.
 His Honor held the defendant was liable for the drainage charge which amounted to £7 per annum. In the opinion of the court the defendant never woke to a sense of his rights until he saw a copy of the lease and noticed that by a mistake of the draftsman an omission was made of the liability to pay the second charge. He gave a decree for the plaintiff with costs.
 Notice of appeal was given.
