WINDSTORM OFF WESTERN SEABOARD.

Business prevailed in the city
owing to the unprecedented delay
of the "Arranmore," the weekly
steamer of the Clyde Shipping Company
between Glasgow and Limerick. Under ordinary
circumstances the vessel should have reached
Limerick on Wednesday afternoon, but stress
of weather compelled her to put into
Cork Bay on Thursday morning at
11 o'clock, where she remained until
Friday. In a conversation with the
officers of the ship, a "Chronicle"
reporter has ascertained that the boat left the
Clyde on Tuesday, and once they made the
Irish coast it blew with great
force for several days. Until they put into Blacksod
harbour, the vessel's face to face with a south-westerly
gale which beat anything that could be
imagined. On Saturday the wind dropped, and
the "Arranmore" resumed her
voyage which she completed at noon on Sunday,
but she suffered from the rude shocks encountered
during the passage. Having regard to the fact that the
crew of the vessel are always Limerick men

the "Arranmore's" safety, and when she
arrived at the quay on Sunday
morning had congregated to learn of the
