Munster's first 'Round the Houses' motor race

THE August Bank Holiday marks the 30th anniversary of Limerick's first "Round the Houses" motor race. Limerick, in the past, had been the venue for many successful fixtures of quite a different character, but this was perhaps the greatest sporting event ever witnessed in the city. 
