After 7/6/86 40 years, Paddy Keane signs off

AFTER OVER 40 years noting the passing parade of births, marriages, deaths and parish pump politics in Murroe and Cappamore, the *Limerick Lead*-er local correspondent Paddy Keane has retired.

Unique among local corres-pondents in his intimate know-ledge of his native East Limerick village and in the fact that he returned to school some years ago to learn shorthand and typing for the job, Mr. Keane has retired for health reasons.

He worked under five editors in his long career of local news reporting and describes the founding and growth of the Cappamore Show as among his happiest experiences.

"Certainly times have changed," he says of the days since he first took pen in hand to report local happenings in 1944. "What we were all talking about then were the sugar and tea rationings," he recalled.

A keen GAA supporter all his life and a founder member of the local Dr. Harty Park committee, Paddy remembers walking three miles to Cappamore in 1935 to hear the All Ireland final be-tween Limerick and Kilkenny over the radio.

Significant

Murroe played its own signifi-cant part in the social and economic history of the country, he tells you. His next-door neighbour down the road was the late Canon John Hayes, founder of Muintir na Tire. The parish also produced two chair-men of Limerick County Coun-cil, Liam Hickey and Pat Ryan.

Paddy's first job, which he describes now as "great gas", was cutting turf on the bog for the Co. Council during "the emergency".

He still plays the accordion and is an avid supporter of traditional music.

Although he has finally put the typewriter away, he says that he will keep in touch with local happenings which he believes are still the lifeblood of local newspapers despite all the adv-ances of communications.

The people of rural Ireland he agrees may have retreated from the village pump but they still want to know what is happening, and, as Paddy Kavanagh put it "gods make their own import-ance".


During that time he had done untold good work for the society and had become as much part of the committee as any other member.
