Cottage nest egg disputed

A CLAIM by Murroe to a "moral entitlement" to some of the profits made by

Limerick County Council from the sales of its shares in the Rent an Irish Cottage company last year has been rejected.

The entire £47,000 profits, the Council decided at a meeting in the education centre in Kilfinane, are to go to a project on the clearing of derelict sites in that town.

The issue threatened a divisive vote on the Council, and involved the two Leader groups in East Limerick, Ballyhoura and Slieve Felim.

Both Murroe and Kilfinane have been bases for Rent an Irish Cottage, although the Murroe cottages had been sold some years ago, when the company was in financial trouble.

Cllr Noel Gleeson said that he was making a bid for a share of the profits primarily on behalf of the Abington Enterprise Centre, where four jobs were at stake at present, as it awaited EC Leader funding.

Cllr Gleeson said that the community in Murroe had fund-raised generously for the Rent an Irish cottages, and when those cottages were sold, no funds were returned to the parish.

County secretary Pat O'Connor said that they intended to invest the profit from the recent sale of their shares, which amounted to £47,311, in an infrastructural project at Kilfinane to eliminate four derelict sites on the main street.

Chairman, Cllr Paddy Hourigan, pointed out that nearly every member on the Council was supporting Ballyhoura and said that if the money had to be divided it would be of little use to anyone.

Cllr John Finucane supported Cllr Gleeson's case, but added: "If we could get an absolute guarantee from the manager that there will be money for Slieve Felim, only then would I be able to go along with giving this money to Ballyhoura."

Cllr Eddie Wade also supported Cllr Gleeson.


A PILGRIM to Croagh Patrick found her car gone from Limerick station when she returned, on Sunday. It was found burned out in Southill, about 10 pm.

MONEYPPOINT power station is one of the biggest causes of pollution in Ireland, and a cleaning up of the operation would bring about an immediate improvement in air quality in the country.

Moneypoint spews out as much nitrogen oxides into the air as all the petrol cars in the country combined.

This is revealed in a newly published air quality survey prepared by the Environmental Research Unit.

The report reveals that Moneypoint spews out 29,200 tonnes of nitrogen oxides into the air each year. The emission from all the petrol cars in the country is virtually the same at approximately 30,000 tonnes.

The story is equally bleak with sulphur dioxide emissions. Just under half (42%) of the entire country-wide emission of sulphur dioxide comes from the coal burning generating station.

The 1985 UN Sulphur Protocol calls for a 30% reduction by this year in the level of sulphur emission. The report points out that Ireland could achieve this reduction easily by switching to low-sulphur coal at Moneypoint. No other measure would be needed.
