ONE of Ireland's top disc jockeys, 19-year-old Danny Hughes, is running his disc show 'In the Groove" at Club Cavalier four nights per week and on Sunday afternoon. From the opening night, the show was an immediate hit, and just now Danny is one of the most popular personalities in Limerick's world of beat.

Whether it's pops, tamala motown or rhythm in blues, Danny has the gift of keeping his audience in the mood. And perhaps one of the reasons for his success is that he believes in keeping his dancers in the know; he explains the recordings, gives a snappy Listory of the beat groups, and keeps, things moving on the dance floor.

Ever since he got his first tape recorder at the age of 13, Danny has wanted to be a disc jockey. From an early age too he took an interest in drama, and at 15 played the part of St. John in a Passion play. He played in "St. Bernadette" at Rathmines, and subsappeared with the subsequently Dramatic Group and the Garrick Actors.

Danny was interviewed in the "Late Late Show" on his performance in the Passion play. For an artiste of such high and varied talent, it was perhaps inevitable that he should make his way to TV, and when he was only 16 he had a three months session in "Jamboree." He number of also made
