Govt. praised, FF rapped

Limerick's Corbally-St. Mary's branch of Fine Gael have passed a resolution commending the Government "for its move to honour an agreed candidate for the high office of President."

The resolution adds: "The determination of Fianna Fail to impose the expense of an election on the country at this point in time is to be deplored."

The accidents occurred as cars spun out of control on the greasy surface, but, fortunately, nobody was injured. The accidents are believed to have occurred within a 15-minute period.
