Dressed in a seedy suit covered with a flapping plastic mac, his hair pushed back and wearing nondescript spectacles, Gene looks the epitome of the average guy, the kind of man who goes unnoticed in the crowd:

Harry's concealed microphone is an instrument so sensitive that it can home in upon the voices of people as far as 200

vards away.

We are also told of the closemouted and embittered privacy of Harry's current employer, a man couched in affluence, man who lives with a thirst for vengeance against the young mistress who is betraying him with the man she meets in the park.

This is a marvellously good film, intriguingly twisting in the development of its plot. It's a serious subject and demands concentration on the part of the viewer. The Conversation must
