ABSOLUTE Beginners -well, the pre-release pub-licity has certainly been licity has certainly been very vigorous, to say the least and in all the reviews I have read about it the views of the different critics have come fast and furious — some say "riotously colourful" and "best musical for years" — others say "the most amateur and monumentous flop ever".

Well, basically as all I have seen so far are clips from it, my lips are sealed. But something I can review is the soundtrack of the movie.

When picking up the record and looking at the nice sprinkling of stars it had to offer I thought it would be a handy task. In truth I think it was.

listening to a record with what I would call a jazz feel to it and with such an old style. No answer to that one – the album continued.

The next song was written and performed by Patsy Kensit's (one of the stars of the film) band, Eighth Wonder, and she really proves that she's not just a pretty face.

Tension

The rest of the album is much in the same vein as before with the songs being performed by Working Week, Slim Gilliard and Jerry Damers, ex Specials, whose instrumental "Riot City" which is the last track on the album, exudes the tension that its name suggests.

There were a lot of shocking brass arrangements and chords flying about creating a certain tension and for this reason I think that some of the music would have made a lot more sense with pictures – "Riot City" for instance.

This albun should appeal to a lot of different people for a lot of different reasons but personally I like it because it was a good album and very different to anything I had ever listened to before. On the performance of the record I will definitely go to see the movie. Available from "Golden Discs".

The stars have come together to record the song for a children's charity. But having professed happiness to hear that it will be released I hope they don't murder it.
