single from Blue In Heaven. This single, as all the others I have mentioned, did not appeal to the general crowd who buy records. Blue In Heaven have just recorded their second album and have had a fair few singles released but one feels that if this album

does not set the charts alight it could be goodbye to the band's contract.

The funny thing is that all the above mentioned bands, the above mentioned bands, without exception, whenever they came to Limerick played in front of huge crowds. So you must say to yourself that it just isn't Limerick's love of live music and that people probably support the bands wherever they play in Ireland -so why don't they buy the records?
