CRY BEFORE DAWN—
Crimes of Conscience — This Irish band who hail from Wexford have been receiving much media hype and around the time they released their debut single, "Gone Forever", which features on the album, were the centre of nearly as much attention and air-play as their much more famous compatriots U2 and at the moment with U2 hysteria in full flow one wonders how that could have been possible. The single "Gone Forever" was a taste of the much awaited album and now that has arrived you wonder what all the fuss was about. I don't really know what to say about the album — it's not really bad, but, there is definitely something missing.

The four members of the band are obviously very good musicians and, indeed, on the album, play quite a few different instruments, such as uilleann pipes and whistles, they just don't seem to have got that full sound which one comes to expect from a CRY BEFORE DAWN — imes of Conscience — This

The current single, "The Seed that's been Sown", is by far the best track on the album and if it is released in Britain as was their debut single is good enough to crack the charts. The problem is the follow-up — the other songs are bordering on being very mediorer.

The tracks which stood out were the two singles, "Gone Forever" and "The Seed that's been Sown"; "Flags" and "Girl in the Ghetto".

This album will be taken to heart by their growing number of Irish fans but will hardly win over any new ones and with its weak almost cabaret like arrangement and production should please the elderly ear and not the young record buying public who they should be aiming for.

Paul Johnson: Paul Johnson — This is a soul/poul album that holds no major surprises for the listener other than being a very solid and enjoyable record which, even though involving Junior, a close friend and recognised artist, as producer, doesn't fall into the hi-energy category, à la Five Star, etc., as one would have expected. It is much more in the late night listening variety with the tempo all through never reaching that freuzied dance floor beat which warrants the most amazing exertion just to keep in time.

It is a good mixture of the slow and middle of the road type soul/pop which you come to expect from young aspiring black soul artists and which was made so popular by such stars as Marvin Gaye, with whom Paul has been favourably compared.

Some of the tracks which really stood out were "New Love", "Burnin", "Fear of Falling", "Heaven is 10 Zillion Light Years Away", which has a very strong gospel backing choir; "Are We Strong Enough", which was the most danceable, and the best song for me was "When Loves Comes Falling".
All the songs featured lovely keyboard and guitar work and the album had a very rich sound all through.

Paul appeared, through his involvement with Junior, on the Red Wedge Tour, which raised funds and promoted the ideals of the English Labour Party and which also featured such established acts as The such established acts as The Style Council, The Smiths and Billy Bragg.

Paul has a superb vocal range and also the ability to control and use it to its full potential. His roots lie in gospel but he has adapted his talents to make an, at times, very enthrelling soul cum light pop album. The record is very well produced and is very easy on the ear. Not a bad effort.
