All winter they have been working

on this debut album and have had to wait until Dave Richards who produced the last David Bowie album and who has also recently worked with Freddie Mercury is ready to start work with them.

"He came over to Limerick to watch the group a few weeks ago and liked what he saw and agreed to work with them", said Haymen.

If everything goes right for "Tuesday Blue", Mike Ryan, Farranshone; Ray Fean, Shannon; Tom Jones, Dublin Road; Ralph Lindheim, Raheen, and Dave Keary, N.C.Rd., Limerick, may not be back in Limerick for another 10 months.

Before they leave they are performing two "gigs" in the Savoy this Thursday and the following Thursday.
