VAN MORRISON & THE CHIEF-TAINS: "Irish Heartbeat" (Mercury). Van Morrison in "laughing on stage" antics. Van Morrison in "joking with audience" shock. Van Morrison in "No. I album sensation." All these things are true. Just which of them would have been deemed most ridiculous a little while ago is debat-able. Van's recent and reputedly



superb performances with The Chieftains seem to have loosened the old bugger up fairly remarkably. The evidence is stamped all over "Irish Heartbeat", nowhere more obviously than on the curious new single, that old standard "I'll Tell Me Ma". There's no doubt that Paddy Moloney's influence on this record is both significant and enormously beneficial.

Van himself has been going through

a pretty inspired creative period in recent years and "Irish Heartbeat" is a valulable addition to his back catalogue. He wrote just two of the tracks but sings brilliantly throughout. Highlights for me are a rousing rendition of the classic "Star Of The County Down" and a classy "Carrickfergus". Indispensable to fans of either of the two participants, it is recommended to fans of great singing and gifted musicianship.
