BLUE BACK

IT'S A BIZARRE situation and nobody's about to pretend otherwise. It could even be history. The premier Limerick rock band spend four years playing almost exclusively in their home town.

They write songs, perform them, change them around, often to the eestatic approval of their partisan home supporters.

A debut LP is recorded, released and unavailable in Limerick for 11 long months. Instead it appears in record stores 3,000 miles away where an underwhelmed American public has a suitably silent enquiry: Tuesday who?

suitably silent enquiry: Tuesday who?

The long wait for Tuesday Blue's rather fine debut LP "Shibumi" ends this Friday when it appears at a record shop near you. Its failure to secure an Irish release sooner has led to disappointment, criticism and a plethora of tape copies of the few originals that made it back from the U.S.

Nobody felt the frustration of this situation more than the members of Tuesday Blue. They're now back from a successful American club tour, rested and ready for an assault on the Irish market.

The return to a Limerick stage happens first this Saturday at the Shannon Arms, and the boys make a second appearance the following day at the Lark In The Park. This

a second appearance the following day at the Lark In The Park. This week they booked into Keric Studios, where in time-honoured rock 'n' roll tradition they've been "laying down" some tracks. In equally time-honoured journalistic tradition I "caught up with" them while they were there, or rather I met ace guitar player Dave Keary, who put the finishing touches to a barnstorming solo on "Stop Thinking," and told me about "Shibumi". "We wanted it released here but people don't realise the politics of the thing. We're signed to an American record company and it's up to EMI's other branches to release it in their countries. We had been pressing for an Irish release. We realised that people delt let-down that it hadn't come out here, but we couldn't do anything about it."

out here, but we couldn't do anything about it."

"Shibumi" will be promoted by the band in record shops in Cork, Dublin and elsewhere. Around mid-August Tu-sday Blue will embark on an frish tour. They haven't played an extensive home tour before, but after the American slog, Tuesday Blue are ready for anything.

Dave speaks of the U.S tour with considerable enthusiasm. They went first to Austin, Texas to acclimatise and rehearse. A city of around 500,000 citizens, it's Nanci Griffith's home-town and a hotbed of diverse live music. The centre of activity, 6th Street, is the length of our own Thomas Street and lined with clubs offering everything from bluegrass to speedmetal.

Tuesday Blue began by playing clubs where nobody knew them. Not too many turned up, but those that did spread the word about some heroic performances. By the time they left Austin to begin the tour proper, their club gigs were packed solid. They were honoured by Mr Lee Cooke, Mayor of Austin, who proclaimed May 19 to be Tuesday Blue Day.

After that, they hit the road.

With them was American tour manager Tim Kyne and band crew Gary Sciascia and Adrian Cunningham. It took 13 hours to get out of Texas and 35 to reach San Diego, the first gig.

Thereafter it was the usual touring experience of soundcheck, performance, bed and bus journey. They played three Texan cities-Austin, Corpus Christi, and Dallas-San Diego, Los Angeles, Long Beach, San Francisco, Providence, Northampton, New York, Washington DC, Baltimore, New Jersey (again), and Philadelphia.

The prestige performance was at

Philadelphia.

The prestige performance was at the Cat Club in Manhattan. The boys were delighted to see some Limerick exiles at this and other gigs. Bigwigs from EMI Manhattan were also at the Cat Club. For all but one of them, it was the first time they'd seen their Irish act.

They now await the Xeric tapes, and will soon compile a shortlist of producers for the second Tuesday Blue LP. This could see the light of day early next year.

In the meantime, there's "Shibumi". Dave Keary: "We're very happy with it. We would have liked to have been there for the mix, but it wasn't possible. There was a couple of minor things we noticed that they guy in the street mightn't. But we're happy with the way it stands. We're pretty proud of it for a first album. I think a lot of people will look back on it in three or four years and see its worth even more."

Every good album can withstand the test of time. Absurdly, "Shibumi" now faces that test head on. Many of Tuesday Blue's loyal local fans know its every note. One acquaintance of mine who picked up a copy in the city of Chicago has loaned it out around 25 times. That said, the feeling is that "Shibumi" is too good not to own. For the rest of Ireland, it's effectively a new product.

Limeri Tom S invest Papal

MR. THOMAS Sheahan, architect, has become the first Limerickman since Sir Vinc at Nash in 1909 to receive the honour of Knight Commander in the Pontifical Equestrian Order of St Gregory.

His investiture, by the Bishop of Limerick, Most Rev. Jeremiah Newman, took place in the oratory of the Salesian Convent, Fernbank, at the weekend.

Dr Newman said that it was "a high privilege and a great personal pleasure" to assist in Mr Sheahan's investiture.

"Those who are raised to the dignity of Papal Knights undertake to continue faithfully to maintain unswerving fidelity to God and the Pope, the Holy See and the Church as a whole," he added.

"I have no doubt whatsoever but that the man who is being honoured thus today, Thomas Francis Sheahan, will continue to do what he has done for years in that respect.

His concern

"He is, like his uncle before him, a credit to our city. The extent of his charity, his beneficence towards the underprivileged, his concern for young people, his devotion to his family and firm, his deep loyalty to his Church, all this is known better to God than to any of us here."

Dr Newman added that he was "delighted" that Mr Sheahan's brother-in-law, Most Rev. Donal Murray, Bishop of Makurdi in Nigeria, was "present today to share in our joy".

Dr Newman also gave a short and informative summary of the five Pontifical Order of Knights—the Supreme Order of Christ, the Order of the Golden Spur, the Order of Pius IX (or the Pian Order), the Order of St Gregory the Great, and the Order of St Gregory Panal Knighthoods were often

the Great, and the Order of St Sylvester.
Papal Knighthoods were often misunderstood, Dr Newman noted, with people tending to associate them without qualification with the civil and military honours conferred by temporal
