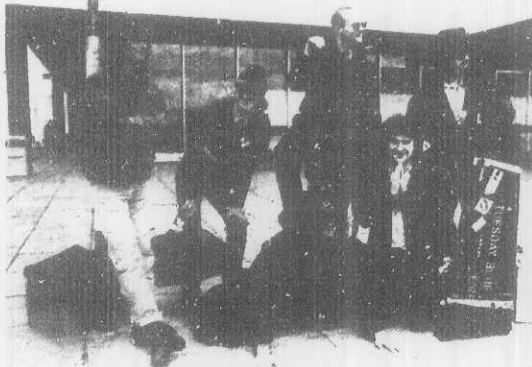
Nice one, Tuesday Blue
