harboard quarter of the Oran-

## of Parents' Association

The annual meeting of St.  
 Munchin's Parish Parents'  
 Association will be held at the

 Floyd, Superior, and officers for  
 the coming year will be elected.  
 This is a very important body,  
 which is doing excellent work  
 to assist the Christian Brothers  
 in the St. Munchin area.  
 Their biggest drive at present  
 is to raise funds for the erec-  
 tion of the new secondary school  
 which will be known as the  
 Edmund Rice High School, now  
 in the course of construction on  
 the North Circular Road

seceded the proposal.  
 Mr. Mac Diarmada said that  
 the present premises in Henry

 Mr. Mac Diarmada said that  
 the cost on building an entirely  
 new headquarters for the  
 Authority would be in the  
 region of £100,000.  
 Mr. Harnett said that the  
 Authority's staff were working  
 under the worst possible con-  
 ditions at the present time.

### CITY HALL

Alderman G. E. Russell said  
 that at one time he had visua-  
 lised the Diocesan Hall as suit-  
 able for a city hall but he was  
 now satisfied that the premises  
 would not be large enough.  
 The Manager's report on the  
 proposition to acquire the Hall  
 included the following re-  
 marks:

Present accommodation is  
 not adequate to meet the needs  
 of the administrative staff, and  
 as you are aware the Chief  
 Medical Officer and his staff  
 occupy accommodation at  
 Lower Gerald Griffin Street and  
 at 71 O'Connell Street, which  
 is both inadequate and unsuit-  
 able. Since the establishment  
 of the Health Authority I have  
 been endeavouring to obtain  
 accommodation which would  
 house both the administrative  
 and public health staffs. The  
 Diocesan Hall at Pery Square  
 was offered to the Authority  
 some time ago on the following  
 terms:—"A rent of £675 per  
 annum clear of all outgoings  
 for a period of fifteen years, the  
 Health Authority being given  
 an option to purchase the  
 property outright at any time  
 during the duration of the lease  
 for a sum of £9,000." This pre-  
 mises is very suitably situated  
 and is in reasonable condition.

The premises have been in-  
 spected by Chevalier Patrick J.  
 Sheahan, F.R., I.A.I., Consulting  
 Architect, and to house the  
 administrative and public health  
 staffs it would be necessary to  
 add another floor, and the  
 Architect estimates the cost of  
 such addition, together with the  
 other reconstruction work re-  
 quired to form suitable office  
 accommodation, would be in the  
 region of £32,000. Mechanical  
 services would cost an additional  
 £8,500. It is accordingly  
 estimated that the total cost
