Final conditions for dancing at Jetland

FINAL conditions, subsequent to the granting of the licence on Saturday last for the running of dances at Limerick's £60,000 Jetland Ballroom, were announced at Limerick Circuit Court on Wednesday by Mr. Justice Barra O Briain.

At the termination of Saturday's proceedings Mr. Justice O Briain intimated that he would be imposing certain conditions on the licence. He had hoped that both sides would have been able to get together and come to an amicable settlement but they had failed to do this.

Giving his conditions, Mr. Justice O Briain said that he had to look at the point that the proprietors of the Ballroom had spent some £60,000 on the project and accordingly were entitled to some chance of regaining their initial output.

He felt that it was a great pity that dance hall licences were not granted in the same manner as were publican licen-

ces. In these instances plans had to be submitted before a licence could be granted but in a dance hall application the owners had to erect their premises and then take a chance about getting a licence.

On the other hand, he said, he had to agree that there was an undoubted amount of noise and disturbance, particularly at the end of dances and he had no doubt either that there had been quite an amount of trespassing on nearby property.

Accordingly he was introducing certain conditions which he hoped would reconcile the two opposing interests for the period up to September 1 next, and he added that he agreed fully with one witness who said that when the pub is erected the place will be a holy fright.

THE CONDITIONS

Prior to announcing his conditions, the Judge stated that he felt the hall had been a colossal success and the proprietors may have been "caught in the rush" and they were entitled to an opportunity to see if they needed more stewarding and then read out the following points which he was making.

Firstly, he would allow the applicants 120 dances from the period of September 1, 1963, to September 1, 1964, from eight to twelve midnight during winter time period, and from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. during summer time period. He also stipulated that ten of the above 120 dances could go on until 1 a.m. during winter time and another ten go on until 2 a.m. during the summer time period. Further, no two extended dances could be held on successive nights and not more than two could be held on any one week. (Heretofore, the licence was for 365 dances with 20 extended dances until 2 a.m.).

All cars and other vehicles must leave the area of the Ballroom within half an hour of the termination of the dances.

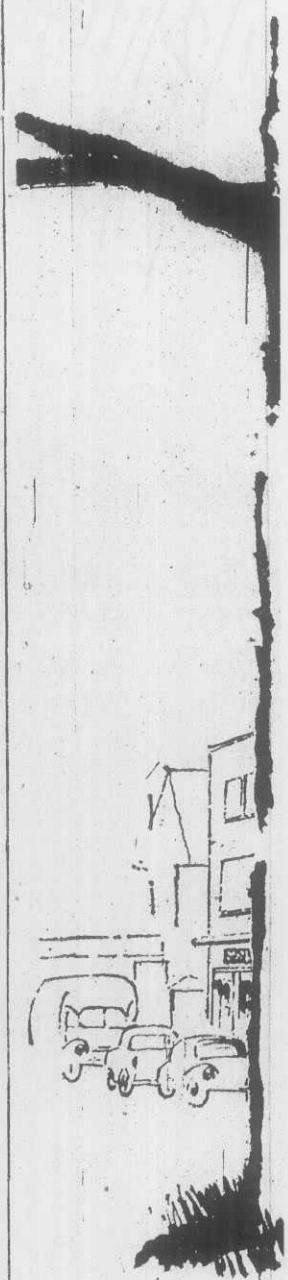
Thirdly, the capacity of the hall would be limited to 2,000 people. It was 300 more prior to this morning.

Persons under the age of 18 years of age and under the influence of intoxicating liquor not to be admitted to the hall.

An hour before the finish of dances an announcement is to be made by the management telling patrons that they must not loiter in the area after the dance or trespass into other property.

Finally, notice of all dances must be given to the Garda Authorities four days prior to being held.
