ARE YOU DANCING?: A CELEBRATION OF LIMERICK'S DANCEHALL DAYS EXHIBITION LAUNCHED

ARE YOU DANCING? A celebration of Limerick's Dancehall Days was launched last Saturday.

The two week exhibition at the Stella Ballroom on Shannon Street features photographs and other memorabilia from Limerick's dancehall days spanning from the end of the orchestra era in the late 1950s right up to the showband era in the early 1970s.

Many locals who frequented the "dances" have contributed personal photographs taken at various city locations such as Toddy's, The Stella, Jetland and

Cruises Hotel along with a host of others that will be on display for the duration of the exhibition.

Speaking at the exhibition organiser David Studer thanked everyone for their contribution and acknowledged the aid from Limerick City of Culture. Creative Communities chair Karen O'Donnell O'Connor outlined how the project came about as a collaboration of many community groups in the city.

Limerick's own Showband star Tommy Drennan reminisced on the city's dancehall days and recounted tales of playing at the Stella during the early days of the Monarchs. He spoke of when the Jetland opened first and paid tribute to an immense wealth of talent that existed

in Limerick at the time, most especially the great musicians that emerged from the smaller local support bands to tour nationally. While Paddy Brennan delved into the history of the showbands in Limerick.

The highlight of the two weeks will be a recreation of the "dances" on Saturday June 22, from 2.30pm to 5.30pm at a specially constructed marquee complete with dance floor at St John's Square. This free family orientated event will feature music from The Kadillacs with Bryan Meehan of the Monarchs headlining who will be joined by Tommy Drennan, Denis Allen, Shaun O'Dowd, Margaret Ring and Michael Shortt.

The exhibition runs until Saturday June 28.

Funded by City of Culture, LIT and led by Learning Hub Limerick, SWIPE offers an exhibition and online competition to both primary and secondary school students in categories including visual communications, digital story telling, filmmaking,

animation and app and coding development.

Online submissions are open until September 14 and taken from our website, which also hosts information and tutorial guides for any novice but interested parties.

The festival is also hosting four weeks of summer camps starting from the June 25 until July 17.

These workshops will include graphic design, photography, animation and film, digital story telling and app and coding. The summer camps have a limited amount places so booking in advance is advised.
