The passing of part of my childhood

I AWOKE last Sunday morning to the news that the former Oyster Ballroom in Dromkeen had been gutted by a huge fire overnight. I was saddened at the passing of yet another part of my childhood.

It was a large part of my life growing up, overlooking it as we did from the family farm across the Mulcair on the Cappamore side. I am not old enough to have gone dancing there, but I do remember playing bingo in Dromkeen as a child with my mother in the late 1970s. I also remember the night that that Thin Lizzy played Dromkeen in April 1980 and my grandmother going down to 'experience' the atmosphere.

That was no ordinary dance night, she always said afterwards. She was nearly 80 at the time!

There are still legendary stories told locally of the night that Jim Reeves played there in 1963 too, when over 2,500

The music from the bands who played there could be clearly heard miles away every Sunday night, from after 9pm 'til very late. Remember, this was also the era before Facebook or, God forbid, Tinder and the dancehalls were the

only opportunity many people had of meeting members of the opposite sex.

My father worked there from the very start (November 1958) to close to the end (early-1981) and holds many fond memories of the place.

Pat Cosgrave (Pallasgreen)

and himself are the last two left who worked there the first night, when Donie Collins sent them home sweatin'. Pakie and Teresa Hayes were tough taskmasters and worked very hard to keep the place going, especially in latter times when people's styles and tastes had

changed with the advent of the lounge bar and disco.

A neighbouring child, James Blackwell, did a fantastic degree thesis a few years celebrating the Oyster, entitled, The Hucklebuck: An Oral History of the Oyster Ballroom. It is well worth searching out and reading.

Another part of old Ireland was buried in the rubble of that fire this week, an important piece that will be missed by a great many people, many who met and courted their life's partner there.

The ballroom in Dromkeen is also the cause of a lifelong addiction that has dogged my life every since: Leeds United! That is a story for another day, though.
