The Funeral

The death of Mr. Frank Muspratt, F.R.C.O., which occurred at his residence, during the week-end, has occasioned much regret in the city, especially in musical circles. He was 78 years of age, and had been organist and choirmaster of St. Mary's Cathedral nearly half a century when he retired a few years ago. Mr. Muspratt was a member of the Royal Academy of Music, London, and as well as being a brilliant organist and pianist, he was a composer of repute. His best known work, "St. Patrick's Breastplate," a sacred theme, had a very favourable reception from the critics, and still holds a cherished place in church music.
