Although the actual work of editing the material offered for publication seldom is great, it would certainly be facilitated were the various authors to follow the scheme for abbreviating titles, etc., used in this Journal since 1971. As will be appreciated, abbreviated title should be immediately reconstructable as they stand to be really viable, thus eliminating the necessity for publication of and reference to a "List of Abbreviations" printed elsewhere in the relevant publication. As pointed out in the Editorial of our Journal for 1971, your editor decided to follow the American Standard of Abbreviations, as also have done the Council for British Archaeology and most archaeological publications published in these islands. This system produces abbreviations which are sufficiently intelligible to, and easily useable by, all readers of learned journals.

Your Hon. Editor is prepared to send, on request, a copy of the abbreviated list of titles of virtually all archaeological publications produced in these islands to authors wishing to write for our *Journal*. However, the publication below of the list of Irish journals and of a selection of the more frequently used British journals may suffice in most cases.
