 rist, they enlarged these phylacteries, lest
 ld not be taken of a pompous, proud Phari-
 ; up to the temple to worship, therefore, the
 r said, "They made broad their phylacte-
 id again, it is said in Deuteronomy, "and
 it bind them for a sign upon thine hand," and
 rdingly tied them on their wrists; and when
