The fire, which originated from spontaneous combustion, broke out about one hundred yards from the bottom of the shaft, and it at once became so serious that orders had to be given for the whole of the men and horses to be withdrawn. The pit is one of the deepest thick coal pits in the country, and some of the men were a mile and a half from the shaft. Fortunately they were all rescued before the fire had cut off the means of exit, and only two of the seventy or eighty horses were lost. Between 700 and 800 men will be thrown out of employment, and it is feared it may never be possible to recommence working. Sand and debris are being carted into the shaft to cut off the air and so stop combustion.

MARCHAND'S NEXT MOVE.

The Daily News Cairo correspondent telegraphs:—There are rumours that Major Marchand has instructions to establish posts at various places on the Bahr El Ghazal and other stations in those districts, but he would return via Jibuti.
