FATE OF RUMANIAN PRINCE AND PRINCESS.

Prince Alexander Cantacuzere and Princess Johanna Cantacuzene were reported to have been among the Iron Guard supporters who were summarily executed following the assassination of M. Calinescu last week.

The Prince was one of the leaders of the Iron Guard and was serving a prison sentence for subversive activities. Three months ago the Princess was sentenced to one year's imprisonment after the alleged discovery of a plot.

The execution of the Prince and Princess was reported to have taken place at Ramniscasarat.
