

the Right Hon the Lord Chancellor, who has been writing for some days past with Colonel the Right William Monsell, M.P., at Tervoe, left by this morning's train for Besborough House, Piltown, on his way to the Earl of Besborough.

On yesterday evening, Mr William McCarthy, one of the buyers in the employment of Messrs. Todd & Co., of this city, was presented with a handsome suit by his fellow buyers in that establishment, on occasion of his departure for Tralee, where he is to start business on his own account.

A deputation, consisting of the following, viz:— Messrs W Bolster, chairman of the Limerick, Clare, Tipperary Farmers' Club, M G Flaherty, V.P., Messrs H Barry, the secretary, W G Carroll, James Key, M Meehan, G Doherty, John Carroll, M Lish, John Sheehy, waited, by invitation, on the High Sheriff this day, in order to arrange preliminaries for the great county and city meeting to be held on the 1st of November in this city. The High Sheriff received the deputation most courteously, and consented to convene the meeting, and to take the chair on the appointed day.

We omitted to particularise the testimonial presented to the Rev. A. Naish, of Rathkeale, on the occasion of his leaving that parish. It consisted of a silver tray, an elaborately finished claret jug, and a set of dessert knives and forks. The articles were understood, purchased at the establishment of Messrs H. Sterling, George-street.

His Worship, the Mayor, has given orders that the posters of horses exhibited in the streets of the boroughing on the evening of Wednesday and the two days of the Munster Fair are to be brought before him or other magistrate convenient, and summarily dealt with according to law, as his worship has declared it to be his intention to rid the city of an intolerable nuisance during the holding of the Munster Fair. The posters of horses have the Fair Green or the stables different posting establishments wherein to have their animals stabled; but they are not to be allowed to block up thoroughfares to the danger of the limbs of the public.

On yesterday and to day, at the City Police Court, only cases for trial were those of a few drunkards, which the usual nominal penalties were enforced by the magistrates.

The Lord Lieutenant, by a proclamation, and with the consent of the Privy Council, has ordered that the Court of Quarter Sessions for transacting criminal business at Newcastle, in this County, shall, from this day, cease, and be discontinued, and all criminal business for the division of Rathkeale, and the western part of the county, shall be carried on at Rathkeale alone, and at the usual times for holding Quarter Sessions in that town; civil bill business being transacted in Newcastle.

We understand that Mr. H. Sterling has left Limerick to-day with a view of selecting his winter's stock of jewellery, watches, &c., from the London manufacturers.

The Secretary of State for War has appointed Major-General Hale to be Acting Assistant Controller at the Curragh Camp, and Mr Hale has reported his arrival, and taken up his duties accordingly. Staff Assistant Surgeon Goodwin has been ordered to proceed to Athlone to take medical charge of the 4th Battery 4th Brigade Royal Artillery at that station.

Major Dirom, of the C Battery C Brigade Royal Horse Artillery, has been granted leave of absence to the end of December next.

The 6th Dragoon Guards arrived on the ground at 1.15 a.m., under command of Lieutenant Colonel Bruce, and looked remarkably well—clean, soldierlike, and in all respects presented that appearance which a heavy cavalry regiment should do. The regiment is well mounted, and the horses do not appear to be anything worse of the drill season. The men's clothing and accoutrements were in good condition, as were also the horse appointments—indeed it may be said that this fine old cavalry corps presented a highly efficient appearance, creditable alike to the men themselves, their officers, and commander. Their drill is quite in keeping with the martial aspect of the regiment, and shows that considerable attention has been given by Colonel Bruce to every branch of interior economy; and it may be fairly said that it is second to no cavalry regiment in the army in its general fitness for service.

He came into possession of the glebe lands of his rectory there were two houses in the possession of two of the late Mr Dixon's stewards. He left both parties in possession as caretakers for the accommodation of the late rector's successor, a clergyman residing in England. One of the parties, Barrett, resides still on the land; but in consequence of some annoyance he received from defendant, and that he wanted the house, he sought at petty sessions to evict the defendant, but on some quibble of law he was defeated, and had to serve a civil bill ejectment. Mr Maguire assured the Court when giving evidence that he repeatedly sought of Mr Dickson not to allow him to be dragged into Court, but to provide a home for his steward; and it was after several applications not attended to that he had to take ejectment proceedings against the defendant.

His Worship said he agreed with the plaintiff, and was surprised, if he were not mistaken in his evidence, that any gentleman who had been so accommodated should not provide a place for his steward. This was not the case of a squatter or pauper, but of a gentleman's servant—one holding possession of another man's premises.

Mr Armstrong, agent to the Messrs Dixon, gave evidence to the giving of possession of the glebe lands to plaintiff, and that he expressed an opinion to plaintiff that he had not originally got legal possession of the house from Walsh as the wife was not put out.

His Worship said he gave a wrong opinion in law. The defendant was examined, and he said his grandfather and father were in the late Rev Mr Dickson's employment, and when his father was going to get married he built the house in question.

Court—Did you see him build it? (laughter).

Witness—No, sir, but I have it from my father.

Court—Do you believe this was part of the Glebe lands?

Witness—I did, sir.

Court—Did your father get any compensation from the Rev Mr Dickson?

Witness—Not a penny, sir.

His Worship said it was evident that the defence set up by the defendant was a most dishonest one, in laying claim to what was the property of Mr Maguire. He could not believe a word he said; he swore to what took place before he was born. It was the strongest case of improper overholding that ever came before him. He could understand a mere pauper setting up such a defence, but here was a man filling the responsible position of steward to a gentleman, the son of the late rector, possessed of a very large fortune, and owner of extensive estates in the county, and to think of such a man coming forward, after the kind acts of Mr Maguire towards him, setting up such a defence as that he relied on. Mr Maguire, instead of pulling down the house as a nuisance, as laid down by the arbitration of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, who allowed defendant a shilling to remove it, put defendant in possession as an act of accommodation to Mr Dickson, and when he got final possession he did not require the defendant's wife to leave, as she was ill. That was relied on as not being a legal possession, because the common proceeding was to get the entire family out of the house and quench the fire, &c; but the man's wife being sick, and he coming outside the hall door and receiving back the key, saying he was ready to take the house as a caretaker, was a perfectly legal possession by the plaintiff. The defendant was clearly a caretaker, and for his misconduct he thought Mr Dickson ought to turn him out of his employment. There was no such ground for setting up the defence, and to mark his disapprobation of the man's misconduct, he would give a decree for possession, with £1 expenses.

This closed the trial of ejectments, after which his Worship proceeded, at one o'clock, to take up defended county bills, none of which were of any public interest.
