LONDON PROVISION MARKET.

(From Jones Brothers' Circular).
 Bacon—Imports of singed sides from Ireland 3,180,
 and from Hamburg 1,494 bales. Arrived to day and
 on the way from Ireland about 1,850 bales. Demand
 for Irish was slow last week at lower prices for all
 but one or two favourite brands of Waterford size-
 able, and purchases limited to the supply of imme-
 diate wants. For Hamburg and Danish cure en-
 quiry was good at 65s, 67s to 69s landed for sizeable
 and light weights. No sales of Irish bale middles
 reported. Arrivals from America into Liverpool were
 452 boxes against 3,493 in the corresponding week
 last year. No transactions here in any sort.
 Beef—For good qualities of Indian Mess and Prime
 Mess there is a steady but not active enquiry. Stocks
 of such are in moderate compass and prices supported.
 Inferior sorts are unsaleable.

Cheese—Imports and American into London and
 Liverpool 28,860 boxes against 18,181 in the cor-
 responding week last year. At present prices best
 American come into competition with English of
 good quality, therefore sales are not as large, but
 with moderate arrivals, and stocks light prices are
 firm.

Hams—Very few Irish of last season's cure now
 remaining. New 8lbs to 11lbs smoked are asked for.

Lard—No change in price for Irish, but few sales
 reported last week.

Pork—Demand slow for pickled middles. For new
 prime mess there is a moderate enquiry at our top
 quotations for good qualities.

LONDON BUTTER MARKET.

Imports of Irish 2,381 firkins. Arrivals to day
 and on the way from Ireland about 2,350 firkins.—
 From the Continent by direct steamers 10,664 casks
 were reported against 9,183 last year; from France
 via Southampton and railway 13,941 packages against
 15,415, and from America and Liverpool 3,710
 against 7,299 last year. Advances of higher rates in
 Ireland have had a corresponding effect here, there
 being little Irish landed unsold. Our quotations are
 the prices now required, and in some instances were
 last week obtained, but demand on the whole was
 slow. Canadian of fair quality is held for 110s to
 114s. For Dutch butters last week prices were lower,
 the quality being inferior, other descriptions of foreign
 were firm. To day Friesland sells slowly at 118s to
 122s; Zwolle and Kampen 112s to 120s; Danish
 and Kiel 80s, 94s, 130s, to 136, Bosch 96 to 104;
 Leer 100s to 106s; Jersey 110s, 116s to 126; Nor-
 mandy 118s 126s to 140s; Morlaix none, and Span-
 ish 84s to 94s.

The weather last week was bright and cold, to-day
 milder.

LONDON CORN MARKET.
