HOSPITAL NOW FACES SECOND INVESTIGATION

AS the Mid-Western Health Board investigation into a claim that a dying man had been left waiting for 61/2 hours in the Regional Hospital casualty unit on Good Friday continues, the Board's deputy CEO has now been asked to investigate the case of second man who was allegedly turned away from the hospital on the same day and who died after being eventually admitted three days later.

The doctor who referred the 78 year old man to the hospital in the first instance, Dr. Michael Lucey, of Croom, has told the *Limerick Leader* that in his opinion the patient was in need of hospitalisation when he saw

him.

But Dr. Lucey refused to comment on the hospital medical staff's assessment of the patient, which according to his relatives took over 4½ hours in the casualty unit.

His daughter told the Limerick Leader—"We were told to take him home. I thought he would die on the way home."

She said that she had been told by their own doctor that he was suffering from a kidney complaint and a chest condition.
He was eventually admitted to the hospital on the following Monday and died on Wednesday, she added. Meanwhile, Mr. Paul Robinson, Deputy CEO of the Health Board, said that the investigation into the original claim revealed in Monday's Limerick Leader by Councillor Willie O'Brien, is continuing. He said that they have the name of the patient who was alleged to

have been kept waiting for 6½ hours and who has since died.

died.

Deputy O'Brien said that the second case was brought to his notice following publicity about his claim at the Health Board.

And another Health Board member, Dr. Darragh Little, says that while he would not pre-empt the results of the investigation, he was fearful in the coming winter of "people, particularly the old, being left to die."

£10,000 junkets approved behind closed doors

LIMERICK City Council have voted behind closed doors to send nine councillors on four foreign junkets to Finland, Netherlands,

junkets to Finland, Netherlands, Sweden and England at an estimated cost of £10,000.

The decision to go, on what the conneillors call "foreign study trips", was made at a recent nuesting "in committee" of the protocol subcommittee, at which 12 of the 17 members were present.

It emerged at that meeting that £3,700 has been spent this year on Junkets. The minutes of the private meeting were circulated with the agenda of this month's full monthly meeting, which is open to the public.

P.D. councillors John Quinn and Tim O'Phriscoll proposed at the protocol committee that none of the four-conferences should be attended.

However, this was opposed by Ald. Patrick Kennedy (F.G.) and Clir. Jack Bourke (F.F.), who progosed that each conference be taken on its merits.

The Fine Gael/Fianna Fail motion was passed. The vote was as follows: for-Ald. Tim Leddin, Mayor (F.G.), Clir. Paddy Madden (F.F.), Clir. Revin Kiely (F.G.), Clir. Jack Bouse (F.F.), Clir. Ger Fahy (F.G.), Ald. P. Kennedy (F.G.), Clir. John O'Connor (F.F.); against-Clir. J. Quinn (P.D.), and Clir. T. O'Driscoll (P.D.).

Then, on the proposal of Clir. P. Madden, seconded by Clir. Jack Bourke, it was agreed that the Mayor and one councillor should attend a housing conference in the Hague, two councillors should go to a conference. for the disabled in Helsinki, and Mayor and one councillors should go to Stockholm and Malmo to a conference

on urban communities, and the Mayor and two councillors should go to a town planning conference in Brighton, Eng-land.

The councillors who go on the junkets will come from the Fine Gael and Fianna Fall parties only as they have a voting pact and are, according to Clir. Frank Prendergast (Labour) "hogging all the trips".

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It is estimated that the money to be spent on the trips in the coming menths will exhaust the remaining £11,340 in the foreign travel kitty. Forther trips will require a supplementary estimate. The councillors who voted against Clir. Madden's proposal were the two P.D. members, Clks. O'Driscoll and Quinn, D.S.P. members Ald. Jim Kennay and Jan O'Sultivan, and People's Democracy member Clir. Joe Harrington.
