## LIMERICK PRIEST Dies in U.S.A.

The death took recently at Ryan, Iowa, U.S.A., of Rev. Denis P. Cregan, P.P., St. Patrick's, Ryan.

Father Cregan was born in County Limerick, on January 20th 1887, and he received his education at Thurles College, in Ireland. He was ordained into the priesthood on June 13, 1913, by Archbishop Fennelly, after which he came to America. He first served as assistant at Sacred Heart Church at Oelwein, 1913 to 1915, at which time he was transferred to Waterloo, where he was assistant pastor of St. Joseph's Church for three years. In 1918 he was assigned as pastor of St. James's Church at Forest City, remaining there 10 years, when he was transferred to Sacred Heart Church at Volga City as pastor until 1937. He came to Ryan to succeed the Rev. M. J. Farrelly, now pastor of St. Martin's Church at Cascade.

Survivors include a sister, Sister M. Bertha, of St. Xavier College in Chicago, and two sisters in Ireland.
