



was dealt in the Teams Competition of Ballybunion Congress. The popular contract was three no trumps by South and West usually led his fourth-highest spade-the six. At one table Sout beat East's knave and took the losing club finesse. East returned the nine of spades and South ducked. When South won the third round of spades he jplayed on diamonds. West, however, won with his ace and cashed two spade tricks to beat the contract by one trick.

If South had been a texbook reader he surely would have avoided defeat. He would have played on diamonds before clubs. West can win his ace and play a spade but South ducks this, wins the next spade and takes the club finesse knowing that nothing can go wrong if West has made a normal opening lead. If East wins and has a spade left this means that the defenders began with four spades each while if East, as in this hand, has no spade left South will have only three

In this hand West was obviously the danger hand and East the safe hand. The principle involved iw well known. When you may have to lose the lead twice you should try to ensure that lose the lead to the safe hand
