FOR AN IRISH PEACE

The "Daily Mail" political correspondent writes:—Negotiations for an Irish peace are by no means at an end. The peacemakers in Ireland are trying to arrange a meeting of Dail Eireann, the Sinn Fein Parliament, to discuss the position in the terms of the Prime Minister's offer in the House of Commons before Christmas, and there are reasons to believe that they will be successful.

Remarkable rumours have been current for some days in London concerning the nature of General Sirickland's report on the Cork fires. They are causing great anxiety to supporters of the Government, and are of such a nature that the possible effect of the report on Sir H Greenwood's position as Irish Secretary is being widely discussed in political circles.
