## Bowie is brought to book by Limerick academics

A SENIOR lecturer in UL's sociology department who hosted a symposium to examine David Bowie's impact and influence has co-edited a book of essays on the iconic rock star.

Eoin Devereux, together with fellow UL academics Aileen Dillane and Martin J. Power, has published David Bowie: Critical Perspectives, 18 essays on the mercurial pop star. The book emerged from Strange Fascination?, the conference organised in 2012 by the Popular Music and Popular Culture Research Cluster in UL.

"Bowie is truly an iconic figure. Our book examines in detail one of the most complex figures within the history of popular music," said Dr Devereux.

"Being true to the subject matter of our book, it crosses a number of academic disciplines in attempting to unpack what David Bowie is all about. When we organised the conference it had a slight retrospective feel to it. Little did we know that Bowie would surprise us all once more, just three months

later, with the release of a new single and an album."

The book contains essays by a range of international scholars on Bowie's work including biographer Dr. David Buckley, Professor Shelton Waldrep and Dr Nick Stevenson.

"It contains a wealth of new material. It examines Bowie's more recent recording work and it provides new details on the making of his 1980 groundbreaking video for the song Ashes to Ashes. The book will appeal to academics but will also be of interest to Bowie fans," added Eoin.
