WEIR CHURCH—RIGHT OF WAY.—A question of importance to the public, in connexion with a way from the river above the Great Lax Weir in Church, and vice versa, in which anglers generally feel a deep interest, recently came under the attention of the magistrates (Sir Hugh Dillon Bart, and George Gloster, Esq.), at Clonlara sessions, having been brought under judicial cognizance by the Rev. Richard Moore, the esteemed rector, entitled to gratitude for his praiseworthy exertions in establishing a legal right, by having the passage opened up. The case occupied five hours in the court, and resulted, as the citizens will be glad to hear, in a decision that the passage to the church is a public road, repaired by county presentments, and that no party causing an obstruction to the free use of the public, acted illegally, and become amenable to the penalties provided by law.
