The *Times*, in a leader on the state of Ireland, admits that the Fenians may possibly succeed in returning one or two Fenian convicts by means of intimidation, and even in driving the Government and the Imperial Parliament into a new suspension of the Habeas Corpus Act. More they cannot do. They cannot alter the immutable law by which the destinies of Ireland and Great Britain are bound up together, nor can they persuade Irish tenant farmers that security of tenure under a Fenian Republic will be more valuable than that under an Act of Parliament. Come what may, a settlement of the Irish Land Question will be effected next session, and will bear fruit in due season.

At Valparaiso there is said to be a large increase of disposable tonnage, and freights have been reduced. Transactions in produce continue limited, but business expected to improve during the next fortnight. The population of the west coast of South America have nearly recovered from the Talb panic, and were returning to their homes. The Chilean crops are reported unusually good. The Cuban Spanish Government have issued a proclamation prohibiting persons from leaving Cuba except under a heavy bond for good behaviour, and for returning in good time.
