She was highly talented, an Arts graduate of the old Royal University, and evinced a deep interest in philanthropic work. Mrs Dodds was a member of the Ladies' Committee of Limerick and District Branch of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children; of the District Nursing Association, and a zealous participant in Presbyterian Church activities. Her pleasant and engaging disposition endeared her to a wide circle of friends, and the sympathy of the citizens will go out to her husband and daughter in their sorrow. The funeral is announced to be private.

NOW SAFE

At present a staff, working under the supervision of Mr. T. F. O'Sullivan, B.E., Harbour Engineer, is engaged in erecting buoys at two points in the Lower Shannon. One buoy is being erected at Waller's Bank and the other on a ledge of rock near Ringmoylan. It has been found necessary to carry out these improvements in order to make navigation more safe for big ships. Waller's Bank, which takes its name from the Waller family of Pallaskenry, is almost apposite Rynanna. It has been a source of considerable danger to shipping, and quite recently one or two vessels met with a little trouble there. The cost of erecting the buoys will be defrayed by the Harbour Commissioners.
