

Their unity of purpose had to be seen to be believed for not did they attend meetings and raise funds but also lent their vocal support at the matches. The boys success became theirs. For as long as so many people are prepared to give of their talents and time above all any club is assured of growth and prosperity.

Limerick's under sixteen team showed much promise this year and brought honour and pride to the hearts of many by reaching the Tailteann Games Final.

These players merited their places among Limerick's best as much for their skills as whole-heartedness. Many of these players may now rightfully set their sights on achieving a minor berth with Limerick.

This club is not short of stars for no less than three have been so acclaimed.

These were: Conor McDermott chosen under 13 footballer of the year. Gary Tobin chosen under 14 footballer of the Year; John O'Reilly chosen under 16 footballer of the Year.

Almost at all levels Marys succeeded in having a player in contention for an award. Just rewards these for the ninety nine per cent perspiration it takes to succeed. Many drops of the latter were shed on many a field this year.

Many will look back to the under fourteen league football final as just one of the classic games of seventy seven when a goal in the last thirty seconds brought its first triumph of the year against a very spirited Na Piarsaigh side. But lest one get the impression that this club are merely a footballing club it should be recalled that no team at any age group got


