He had won 200 prizes, including Irish championships, in the highest company of those days of rich Irish athletic talent, before departing for America, were his consistent success at indoor and outdoor arenas won him the title of "The Irish rubber-ball." On his return to Ireland he had a big presentation from Irish-American patriots, whom he had served well. He appeared at Sean's Park, Belfast, where he cleared 6ft. Mick Creed told me he strained a muscle that day, which never mended. He settled down to business at Bruff. An industrious progressive merchant, he built up a prosperous trade, gave much assistance to G.A.A. clubs, local charities and native sports. He rarely missed a big match—I met him last at Thurles Gaclic Park in a Munster final between Limerick and Cork. He was a most loveable personality with a fund of droll stories, told with delightful good humour. His adventures at home and abroad would fill volumes. We travelled many boreens together. His illness was brief. To his wife and family I tender my sincere sympathies. R.I.P.

This Duhallow man was as huge as Creed was tidy—big Tem Ludgate of Ballyclough, Mallow—still a brawny, comfortable farmer who, in his youth, excelled with the heavy weights. In fact four of their members, the biggest representation from any club in the resentation from any club in the country, were picked on the Invasion Team, which toured America in 1888.

Down through the years although having some fine players who represented Limerick in all grades. The club won many fine tournaments but had not much success at county cham-

pionship level.

In 1972 the club was reformed after a lapse of a number of years and success was soon to follow. That year the club reached the South final in under 14 hurling. The club lost three South juvenile hurling championship finals in a row, 1972 to 1974 inclusive.

We really hit the headlines in 1974 when we won our first county MH championship. South under 21 honours fol-

South under 21 honours followed the next year.

In 1976 we again won the South MH championship and also made the big breakthrough in junior hurling winning the South championship but losing the county final to Granagh after a replay.

The club bounced back the following year and although

following year and although beaten in the South final went on to win the county junior hurling title defeating Murroe in the final.

In 1978 we won our third South MH championship and in 1980 we won the South MH League.

The GAA ideal of a team and a field in every parish was advanced a step further in 1982 when the club purchased it's own field, which it is hoped will be a major asset to the club and be a major asset to the club and players in the future.

AT the beginning of 1972 the Stakers GAA Club was reformed after a lapse of a number of years. Up to then players from the parish assisted neighbouring clubs such as Kilmallock, Knockaney, Garryspillane and Dromin-Athlacca. Some of the players who won honours with these clubs were Mike Heffernan, Mike Heelan, Joe Brazil, Nicholas and Dominic Hayes who won County S.H. Championship medals with Kilmallock. Patsy Meara who won South J.H. Championship medals with Bruff (1968) and Dromin-Athlacca 1971. David Ryan who won South J.H. Championship medals with Knockaney 1967 and Dromin-Athlacca 1971. Under age players at that time such as John Lyons, Dominic Ryan, Joe Hayes, Tom Leahy played with neighbouring clubs in the minor grade.

This year 1982 the club decided to purchase their own playing pitch at Ballinvana on Knocklong-Kilmallock Road up to then the club used the pitch at Elton (they still use this) but it was outside the parish and could never be their own GAA field. Michael Treacy, Conal Kelly and Denis Martin were appointed trustees and they, along with an energetic committee set about paying off the debt. In the early part of the year they held a house-to-house collection and raised £2,250. This collection will be continued into the early part of 1983 and the committee are confident of raising another £1,500. A Gala field day was held in October by kind permission of John Carroll and Mr. Maher and a dance held in the Castle Lounge by kind permission of Conal and Mary Kelly that night raised a further £800. Upwards of £1,000 was raised by John O'Brien who completed the Dublin City Marathon on behalf of the club in two hours 40 minutes. The committee are confident that the remaining debt will be cleared in 1983. When this is done the club will proceed with the building of dressing rooms and a Community Hall, which will cater for all organisations in the parish. The parish although being one of the smallest in Limerick (pop. 600) are proud of the work being done by the GAA for the youth in the area, and hope that in 1984 the club will have one of the finest playing pitches and community halls in the county.
