DEFEAT OF THE TURKS BY THE CRETAN INSURGENTS.

St Petersburg, Thursday, May 16. It is stated that his Majesty the King of the Greeks has received a despatch from Athens announcing that Omar Pasha, after a three days' battle, had been beaten by the Cretan insurgents.
