

Sean O'Shea, born in Hospital, Co. Limerick but living in Longford since he was three months old was the only Limerick born player on the winning Thomond College side, The first All Ireland Senior Football championship was organised on a club basis and it was won by Limerick Commercials. That was ninety years ago and the final was played at Cloneskeagh, Dublin on 29th April 1888, where Commercials beat Young Irelands of Dundalk, 1-4 to 0-3.

Thomond College regained the title for Shannonside in 1978, playing eight exciting and epoch making games, including the County Limerick final, in the process. These games are worth recording:

4th December 1977. Limerick County Senior Football Final at Kilmallock. Thomond College 1-12 Croom, holders 0-4

11th December 1977. Munster Inter Club Senior Football championship at Pairc na nGael. Thomond College 2-6, Austin Stacks, Kerry, All Ireland Champions 2-6.

18th December 1977. Replay at Pairc Ui Chaoimh, Thomond College 3-4, Austin Stacks 1-10.

15th January 1978. Second replay and extra time at Pairc Ui Chaoimh, Thomond College 2-18, Austin Stacks 3-15.

22nd January 1978. Third replay at Pairc Ui Chaoimh, Thomond College 3-8, Austin Stacks 2-5.

5th February 1978. Munster Final at Pairc Ui Chaoimh Thomond College 0-12 Nemo Rangers, Cork 1-3.

5th March 1978. All Ireland semi-final at Pairc na nGael Thomond College 1-12, St. Marys Sligo 1-8.

26th March 1978, All Ireland Final at Croke Park, Thomond College 2-14, St. Johns, Belfast 1-3.



Thomond College - A big impact on Limerick Football

College, Thomond formerly known as the National College of Physical Education, opened in Limerick in January 1973, Its purpose was to train teachers for secondary These teachers would be highly qualified in areas, ph ysical education and a second subject of their choice. The college was not intended to produce super athletes but rather highly qualified teachers. People in general tend to think of Physical Education as a course, in physical exercises, football and athletics. This is in fact quite untrue, the course consists of three areas. Physical Education, Education, and Second Subject. The hours are equally divided between the three areas and when one that Physical Education includes 50%

theory only about one sixth of each week is devoted to actual physicals.

Early in the history of college, students recognising the need for practice and competition set up their own clubs and societies. These are run by students and funded by though students lecturers help in coaching. These clubs are voluntary and must meet outside lecture times, i.e. lunch hour, evenings weekends. These clubs enter various le agues competitions.

The G.A.A. club is one of these clubs, it has a membership of about 60 and is run like any other G.A.A. club in the country. I think it important to stress at this point that it is a G.A.A. club and not a football club and is run in accordance with G.A.A. rules. It has a hurling team and a football team and hopes to foster handball at a later stage when facilities become available.

It has enjoyed great success with its football team in particular winning many Higher Education titles. This year after 4 previous attempts the club won the Limerick county championship and hopes to do well in the All Ireland club championship.

It has been said that the college team has a great advantage over other teams, since all its players are physically fit and have nothing else to do except play football all the time. However most of this is untrue and should be seen in its proper perspective. Some of the advantages it has are (i) facilities for training, (ii) players are together all the time, (iii)

because of the nature of the college, players tend to be dedicated and physically well endowed. (iv) We tend from time to time to get good county players.

These however are slight advantages, most clubs have facilities for training which would compare with the P.E. College, All that is needed is a field, dressing rooms and footballs. This is all the college team ever use. During college term all our players are together but during teaching practice. Christmas, Easter Summer holidays which accounts for 25 weeks of the year the players are dispersed all over country and even farther afield. In our attempts to win the Limerick championship and other competitions this has hindered us greatly. Our
