Bryan, aged 32, lived at Enagross Park up to 18 months ago when he left Limerick to go and work with his brother Dominic in Kilkenny.

It is unclear why he left Limerick with his wife Marie (nee Patterson) from Ballycough Avenue, Ballinacurra Veston, and their four children, Norma, Jenny, James and Martin, whose ages range from two and a half to 11.

One of the people actively involved in the republican movement who Martin Bryan admired was the late Mrs. Mary McGlinchy, whose sons Declan and Dominic and baby Maria stayed in the Bryan home in Moyross for about six weeks before moving to Dunalk about two years ago. Prior to that the McGlinchy's had lived in Shannon.

Shortly after this, on June 2, 1985, Bryan was involved in a traffic accident in Ballynanty in which a young child was killed.

He was subsequently convicted of careless driving.

Garda sources told the Limerick Leader that cash believed to have been taken from Burgerland was found in a concealed compartment in the wardrobe of his home in Moyross along with £2,000 in northern Irish bank notes.

He was never charged with his incident but the money was later returned to Burgerland by court order.

Major Thomond Park plan is unfolded

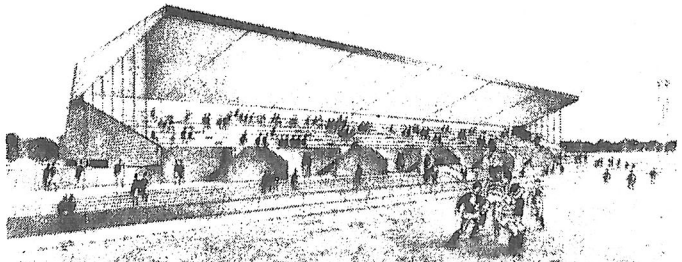

A MAJOR development plan for one of Ireland's top rugby venues, Thomond Park, was announced this Monday afternoon by the President of the Munster branch, former international star, Noel Murphy.

The plan envisages the provision of a new ultra modern stand at Thomond which will seat 1,234 and will cost £600,000.

The Irish Rugby Football Union will contribute £300,000 towards the provision of the new stand and the Munster Branch will have to find the remainder of the cash.

Mr. Murphy announced plans for a major fund raising project.



"The main thrust of our fund raising efforts will be a monthly draw run over a twelve month period. We feel that with attractive prizes such as cars and cash we will be able to sell 3,500 tickets at £100 each. Prizes will cost £149,000 and deducting £10,000 for expenses we are estimating an income from this draw of £191,000," said Mr. Murphy.

Prizes will include five Sierra Sapphire cars, one BMW

316 and six cash prizes of £10,000 each. There will also be other cash prizes and sellers prizes for individuals and clubs.

Mr. Murphy also believes that expressions of goodwill from local and national businesses will bring in £25,000 and it is also the intention to sell 200 ten year tickets for the new stand which, at £200 each, should generate an income of £40,000.
