

MUNGRET COLLEGE SILVER JUBILEE:

Interesting Function.

Yesterday was a red-letter day at Mungret College, when the Very Rev. T. V. Nolan, S.J., Rector, and the Jesuit Fathers in charge of the College, eelebrated the Silver Jubilee of that well-known educational Institution.

The college stands within the grounds of the old Abbey of Mungret, the history of which goes back to the days of the National Apostle of Ireland, St. Patrick, and the building is erected on a riding sweep of land, affording charming views of the Shannon and the pineclad hills of Clare. The college was originally erected by the Government as a model agricultural school, which proved a failure for want of adequate public support, and in 1882 it came into the possession of the Jesuit Fathers who have remodelled the structure, made several additions to it, and fitted it up in every way as a great university and missionary teaching school. Priests and pupils entered with much spirit into the celebration yesterday. The grounds were tastefully decorated for the occasion, and fine weather favoured the proceedings. The visitors comprised past pupils, their friends and others, and they were received by the Rector on the handsome lawn fronting the college.

The visitors were entertained at luncheon, at the conclusion of which Mr. J. Greene Barry, J.P., D.L., proposed the toast of "The College and its Silver Jubilee." He referred to the fact that he was the surviver of the eminent men who formed the body of trustees for Mungret, whose memory it was a pleasure for him to look back to The late Lord Emly, Sir Stephen de Vere, whose memory would always be held in the greatest esteem in Mungret (hear, hear). In speaking of those gentlemen he should also couple with their names, those of the good founder of the College, Rev. Wm. Ronau, and of its present Rector, Father Nolan (hear, hear). Mr. Barry traced the history of the building up to the time it was taken in charge by Father Ronau. The ancient Abbey of Mungret had sent scholars and missionaries throughout the world, and suraly modern Mungret was following

that example to the greatest degree.

Rev. Fr. Nolan (Rector), in replying to the toast, said it was to him a very great privilege to be in charge of a college such as that, with its rich promise of success in the future to complete the great success it had made in the past. (Hear, hear.) The rev. gentleman referred to the assistance that had been given to them by their friends, many of whom he saw around him that day, and said it was with the greatest pleasure he saw Fr. Ronan amongst them, and he was sure they would all join with him in toasting his

Rev. Fr. Ronan, who was received with applause, in a brief address replied to the toast of his health.
