The judges' decision on the
Graduate Designer of the year
1987 was unanimously in favour of
Siobhan Ryan, a graduate of
Limerick School of Art & Design
who received a National Diploma
in Design (Ceramics) with Credit,
and who, in the opinion of the
judges, was "the designer with the
most promise whose work demonstrates fluency, self-confidence strates fluency, self-confidence and determination to carry out, in three dimensions, her own unique

ideas."

The 1987 Award being in the category of Product Design presented the judges with task the of "selecting the most outstanding designer... the designer we believe relecting the most outstanding designer... the designer we believe has the best potential, the one we expect to be hearing about and seeing a lot of in the future" from graduating students in five colleges and from six specialist areas: Carlow RTC (Industrial Design), College of Marketing and Design (Furniture), Limerick School of Art and Design (Ceramics), National College of Art and Design (Industrial Design and Craft Design — ceramics, glass, jewellery, metals) and the University of Ulster's Faculty of Art and Design/Department of Applied and Decorative Art — silversmithing and jewellery, ceramics).

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In the judges' selection process, the field was narrowed down to "one or two designers from each course. Hot contenders for the Award this year included Suzanne Andersen (Ceramics) from Limerick SAD and Pamela Wilson and Jill Ferguson (both Silversmithing and Jewellery) from Belfast, all of whom produced excellent work. In the end, though, our final unanimous choice of the designer with the most promise is Siobhan Ryan."

She has taken over from Ms. Marie O'Connor, the recently appointed PRO for Fine Gael in East Limerick, who explained: "Because of my political profile I have resigned as organiser. It is important that the information centres are seen as non-political and impartial."

The local centre, who receive

The local centre, who receive £450 each year, fear that if the National Services Board is axed they will lose all the impartial information, training and updating they get from the board.

The volunteers at the centre help people with numerous problems, with social welfare dominating the list. They also help old people fill in tax forms.
