ALL-IRELAND DOUBLE

Third tit Downes i weel

For the second time ever, I coveted All-Ireland senior when, at Killanaule, Co. Tipperary, 19-year-old John Downes (Kilmuckridge) won a 200 yards winner of the Limerick reversed last year team award to defeat the over 50 points.

Limerick last won the double in 1957, when Benny O'Sullivan took the individual award, and three members of that team, Mick and Sean O'Sullivan and Jackie Houlihan, figured in yesterday's thrilling victory.

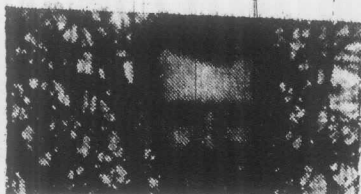
Yesterday's win was the third in a row within four weeks for the Kilmallock runner, John Downes (he has previously captured the Limerick and Munster senior titles), but all previous wins were completely overshadowed by yesterday's brilliant performance.

With two laps to go of the nine mile course, John stepped up the pace; and with his free, easy-going style, drew away from the Dublin runner, M. Rudden, to win in a sprint finish by 200 yards.
