I am sure there will scarcely be any disagreement in the mind of any Deputy who examines the matter as to the figure of £1,800, which is to be the maximum that can be awarded in certain circumstances

London, Monday." TRISH film actress Kathleen Ryan, wife of Dr. Derry Devane, of Limerick, who flew to London yesterday to make a short television film for Douglas Fairbanks, junr., was busy to-day working on the film.

In it she plays the part of a young wife whose marriage goes on the rocks. It is one of thirty-nine television "quickies" Fairbanks is producing in Britain for distribution to American television companies.

Each film will cost £75,000 to make and will run for half an hour.

Lionel Grose, Casting Director for Fairbanks, told the Irish News Agency in London to-day that Kathleen Ryan was specially chosen for the part. The reason she was selected, he said, was: "The film is based on Ireland and Mr. Fairbanks wanted an Irish actress who is warm and sympathetic as well as beautiful."
